70th Anniversary Feature: An Interview with Dan Dickerson

Connection to Riverside:

Tim and Greg, my younger brothers, have both attended and been involved with Riverside almost since birth. My Father and Mother, both deceased, Lowell (Pat) and Phyllis Dickerson, were both heavily involved. My sister Rhonda and her daughter both worked for Riverside.

When and how did you first come into contact with Riverside? Before I was 10 I remember Mom and Dad involved in the early campaign to build the Riverside building. Now decades later both brothers live with me and my wife of 52 years, Fay, and I am an independent provider for both brothers.

What services did your family members have through the years? Tim and Greg both attended Riverside and later RT. They still work through RT.

How was your family involved?

My Dad started the Riverside softball team, and with help from the team, built the ball field behind Riverside. He subsequently led the team to a national championship.

Over the years Tim and Greg both participated in the Special Olympics as well as bowling. They still enjoy bowling through The Arc. Greg was also on the basketball and volleyball teams. He was also a member of the bell choir for many years.

What were some of the biggest challenges your family members faced?

Learning the best ways to help Tim and Greg cope with day-to-day activities.

What changes did you witness throughout the years?

The development of how society has changed its mind and approach to people with disabilities and have accepted them as an equal part of society.

What achievements are you most proud of?

The fact that our family was so involved over the many years. In fact my children and even my grandchildren are involved and still helping out.

What advice would you give to a family member of a person with a disability?

Any family member who has a person with disability should accept them as they are and work to enrich their lives together.

Is there anything else you would like to share?

Just that this short questionnaire has awakened many memories and that we are very fortunate to have such an excellent member of the family such as Riverside and its people over the decades as it has grown into an example for others to strive for.



Meet Calvin Arnett with Limitless Abilities

Calvin Arnett became a Direct Support Professional (DSP) 3 years ago and he says it's the greatest thing he's ever done. "The ability to help the people we serve makes your life so much better," he says. "It teaches you so much about yourself and how much you care about other people."

Calvin and his mother, Teri Watkins, another DSP, started a new business in March 2022. "Limitless Abilities" provides adult day services for people with developmental disabilities in Miami, Darke and Shelby Counties. They provide transportation to and from activities for their 5-hour weekday programming. They can serve up to 8 people at a time.

According to Calvin, Limitless Abilities is focused on serving the needs of the people they support. They want to do what the people served want to do, and seek their input each step of the way. "We get excited when we help them get comfortable making strides in their personal lives," he says.

Tammy Mayberry enjoys her work as a DSP. She is independently certified through the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities, and as an independent provider of services, she enjoys the freedom of being self-employed.

Meet Tammy Mayberry, Independent Provider

Tammy's friend, Dana, introduced her to the concept of becoming a DSP. After working for 12 years doing taxes at a local CPA firm, Tammy learned she could use her fiscal knowledge to help people with developmental disabilities manage their money. She worked with Riverside to earn her certification, and she has been serving as a "payee" helping people budget their funds, in addition to providing in-home services for several adults. She has been a DSP for 3 years now, and currently serves 15 people.

"Being a DSP is exciting!" Tammy says. "I sit in meetings where these people make goals, whether it is learning to cook a spaghetti dinner or saving for a vacation in July. Some of these people have never had choices, never been cheered on for their accomplishments, never were the first ones picked. To see them hit those goals ... I just want to cry."

Tammy's services as a payee are in high demand. She currently helps 11 people, but has 6 additional people pending decisions or interviewing soon.

To anyone who is considering becoming a DSP, Tammy offers enthusiastic encouragement. "It is life changing. These people become like family. I love my work."
